

What Is The YSC?

On September 15th, 1987 the Ocean County Youth Services Commission was established by the Board of Chosen Freeholders.

The Youth Services Commission is a group of community stakeholders appointed by the Board of Chosen Freeholders that oversees the planning and development of community based programs and services for at-risk youth and youth involved in the Family Court System. These programs and services are funded through State and Federal grant dollars. As part of the Juvenile Justice Reform Act in 1995, The New Jersey Administrative Code mandated Youth Services Commissions throughout the state.

The Ocean County Youth Services Commission does not directly provide services; however, the YSC competitively contracts with agencies to provide community based services for at-risk youth, and youth and families involved with the Family Court System. The YSC completes an extensive Plan and Application process for State and Federal grant funds every three years for the Juvenile Justice Commission. The programs and services provided are based on the needs of the youth and families in Ocean County.

Points of the Juvenile Justice System Continuum

Prevention

Delinquency Prevention Programs are strategies and services designed to increase the

likelihood that youth will remain free from initial involvement with the formal or informal

juvenile justice system. The goal of delinquency prevention is to prevent youth from engaging in anti-social and delinquent behavior and from taking part in other problem behaviors that are

pathways to delinquency. Primary Delinquency Prevention programs are those directed at the entire juvenile population without regard to risk of involvement in the juvenile justice system. Secondary Delinquency Prevention programs are those directed at youth who are at higher risk of involvement in the juvenile justice system then the general population.

Diversion

The Diversion stage of the juvenile justice system offers alleged juvenile offenders an

opportunity to avoid arrest and/or prosecution by providing alternatives to the formal

juvenile justice system process. The goal of Diversion is to provide services and/or informal sanctions to youth who have begun to engage in antisocial and low level delinquent behavior in an effort to prevent youth from continuing on a delinquent pathway. Youth who do not successfully complete a diversion program may ultimately have their case referred for formal processing by the juvenile court.

Detention/Detention Alternative

"Detention" is defined as the temporary care of juveniles in physically restricting facilities pending court disposition (N.J.A.C. 13:92-1.2).

An objective of detention is to provide secure custody for those juveniles who are deemed a threat to the physical safety of the community and/or whose confinement is necessary to insure their presence at the next court hearing (N.J.A.C. 13:92-1.3).

Detention Alternative Programs provide supervision to juveniles who would otherwise be placed in a secure detention facility while awaiting their adjudicatory hearing, expanding the array of pre-adjudication placement options available to the judiciary. These programs are designed to provide short-term (45-60 days) supervision sufficient to safely maintain

appropriate youth in the community while awaiting the final disposition of their case. As such, these programs help to reduce the overall detention population and relieve detention

overcrowding and its related problems where it exists.

Disposition

Disposition is the phase of the juvenile justice system where youth adjudicated delinquent are ordered by the court to comply with specific sanctions, supervision, and services as a consequence for their delinquent behavior. In New Jersey, the range of dispositions available to the court include but are not limited to restitution/fines, community service, probation, and

commitment to the Juvenile Justice Commission. For youth disposed to a term of probation

supervision, among the conditions of probation that might be imposed by the court is the

completion of a Dispositional Option Program. The structure of these Dispositional Option Programs are varied, but common among these options are intensive supervision programs, day and evening reporting centers, and structured day and residential programs.

Reentry

In the juvenile justice system Reentry generally refers to the period of community-based

supervision and services that follows a juvenile's release from a secure facility, residential

program, or other structured dispositional placement. Reentry applies to committed youth

paroled from a Juvenile Justice Commission (JJC) facility and supervised by the JJC's Office of Juvenile Parole and Transitional Services and to juveniles disposed to a JJC program as a condition of probation and supervised by the Department of Probation. Reentry is a mechanism for providing the additional support during this transitional period that is necessary to foster the successful reintegration of juveniles into their communities.

Juvenile Detention Alternatives Initiative (JDAI)

The Annie E. Casey Foundation launched the JDAI in 1992 to deal with the hundreds of

thousands of youth inappropriately or unnecessarily detained in dangerous, overcrowded

detention centers nationwide. Increased risk of recidivism, severed ties to families and schools, and high costs to taxpayers resulted from unnecessary incarceration. Ocean County has been a JDAI site since 2005.

The purpose of the JDAI is to use secure detention and detention alternatives appropriately--to achieve consistency and fairness by improving the Juvenile Justice System from admissions through case processing and probation. We use a collaborative data-driven process involving all relevant Juvenile Justice stakeholders.

2016 Needs Assessment Results Summary

In 2016 the YSC conducted a County wide Needs Assessment to determine if there gaps in services and what the needs of the youth and families involved in the family court system are.

2016 Needs Assessment Results Summary

2016 Needs Assessment Survey Results: 505 total responses

This is the Family Crisis Intervention Unit out of Court under the guidelines set forth in N.J.S.A. 2A:4A-76 et seq. and the Juvenile/Family Crisis Operations Manual by the New Jersey Judiciary.

Program provides services or a referral to all callers. Staff provides in-person screening, as well as short-term crisis counseling. The goal of this program is to stabilize juvenile family crisis and prevent these youth from entering the Family Court System.

Mission & Goals of the Ocean County MDT

The Multi Disciplinary Team (MDT) was established by the Youth Service Commission for purposes of insuring planning, which offers alternatives to detention and shelter care. The team's recommendations are provided to the Judge for consideration.

The team meets on a weekly basis to keep current with an everchanging juvenile population. The MDT acts as a voting body. Team members will make a referral, and the team will approve or deny the referral based on supporting evidence and discussion.

MDT is comprised of multiple County and State liaisons. Our weekly meetings include representatives from Intake, Probation, JJC, CMO, DCP&P, Prosecutor's office, Public Defender's office and the Juvenile Detention Center. Other County organizations will attend if they have a juvenile in their care, such as mental heath service providers.

The goal is to assist the Family Court in the use of alternatives so that juveniles are in detention the shortest time necessary consistent with public safety. The mission is to decrease the number of juveniles in detention who are appropriate for alternative placement and to make the most appropriate use of resources in the community.

Stationhouse Adjustment

In January 2014 in partnership with the Prosecutor's office FCIU began a pilot program to see if there would be a reduction in reoffending if counseling was offered at the Stationhouse Adjustment level. The program was geared towards juveniles who had committed a crime which was eligible for a stationhouse adjustment. The officers would determine if the juvenile would benefit from counseling to decrease any ongoing issues which could have led to the juvenile offending initially.

When a juvenile is referred the case is opened and the FCIU counselor will determine the length of services needed. The juvenile will be offered at maximum twelve sessions with the Stationhouse Adjustment needing to be closed within six months.

Since January 2016 FCIU has received twelve (12) referrals; of the twelve (12), nine (9) were appropriate and were opened for services. At the end of the 2015 year five (5) have been successfully closed, four (4) cases remain open, and one juvenile was referred to the Prosecutor for a violation and a complaint being filed. At this time FCIU is not monitoring whether or not juveniles have been successful in regards to reoffending, just the success of completion of the program.

The project continues to be running smoothly and has aided in strengthening the relationships between FCIU and the prosecutor's office and FCIU and the Ocean County Police Departments.

This Parent Orientation program is designed for parents of juveniles who are placed on probation. The goal is to reduce the rate of youth placed in detention for violations of probation on non-delinquency offenses. Our objective will be to have all parents of new probationers attend an orientation within 45 days from the date their child is placed on probation. Parents will be oriented on what to expect while their son or daughter is on probation and provided guidance on how they can assist their child in complying with the conditions and successfully completing probation. Probation Officers will orient the parents as to the conditions of probation, community service, what is required for an early termination, what to expect from home visits and other components of probation. The program will also provide parents with a comprehensive list of available, local resources for youth and families that will offer assistance regarding substance abuse, anger management, crisis intervention, and many other services. A manual containing important phone numbers and information about various social service agencies will be handed out to all participants. Light refreshments will be available in an effort to make the program comfortable for all attendees. Sessions will be held at various sites throughout the county to ease the burden of traveling for the participants. Depending on the need and the success of the orientation, guarterly or even monthly sessions could be implemented at each location.
